Our commitment to youth begins here at home. We are providing free piano instruction within the **Cleveland Metropolitan School District** through our PianoLab program, reaching young students who are filled with enthusiasm to learn piano but otherwise do not have access to the instrument. Paired with our Piano

and Keyboard Donation Program and our expanding education projects within Cleveland schools, we are committed to ensuring that every student in Cleveland can experience the joy of piano.

In the following pages, you will see the power of your support in allowing us to create these transformational piano experiences for youth both here and abroad. As we look towards our **50th Anniversary Season** next year, we hope you will join us in celebrating the evolution of these young stars – and of our organization – through the 2024 Cleveland International Piano Competition and beyond.

Winner's Spotlight SAEHYUN KIM (16), SOUTH KOREA



Growing up in South Korea, **Saehyun Kim**noticed a lot of "uniformity" around him.

"We all have to have a similar style of hair or similar style of outfits, similar style in taste of food or movies or anything. There's always something that you have to follow."

But as an artist, Saehyun yearned to share his musical individuality, something he found easier to do once he came to study at an arts high school in the United States.

"Here it's a lot more diverse - it's more about finding your own path in life, and I found that intriguing."

There was another thing Saehyun found challenging about living in South Korea: the competitive atmosphere that kept him from engaging fully in his art. "I don't think competitiveness and music go together."

Strange words from a competition winner? Maybe, but Saeyhun would disagree. For him, competitions are opportunities for him to **share his unique artistry** with engaged audiences around the world.

For Saehyun, nowhere was this experience more palpable than during this summer's Cleveland International Piano Competition

for Young Artists, especially having the opportunity to collaborate with musicians of the highest caliber during his Final Round performances here in Cleveland.


"I think [Dane Johansen and Jessica Lee of The Cleveland Orchestra] are the best people I've ever played with. Whatever I did on the piano, they immediately reacted to it — like when I made sudden tempo changes or color changes. They're very sensitive and I think we worked well as a team."

While all of his performance experiences at the CIPC for Young Artists were "a dream come true" for Saehyun, it's his big First Prize win that will make a significant impact in his career trajectory. In the next year, he will make his Northern Mississippi Symphony Orchestra debut in April, plus concerts in Paris and as a featured Guest Artist at the 2024 International Keyboard Odyssiad® & Festival.

While new engagements mean new repertoire, this is a welcome challenge for Saehyun, one of today's most exciting young pianists.

"I'm planning on building my repertoire and trying to find something new in myself. The most important thing is that I trust my relationship with music and believe in what I do."

Winner's Spotlight ELISEY MYSIN (13), RUSSIA

Not every kid goes viral at five years old due to their astounding talent, but **Elisey Mysin** is not just any kid.

Showing an interest in his family's "big old black piano" even as a baby, Elisey began formal piano instruction at only four years old.

The next year, the world got its first glimpse of Elisey's musical prowess, as he was featured on a Russian competition show that gathered multimillion views on television and social networks globally.

In 2021, one of Elisey's performances again went viral via international music magazine Classic FM, who named him a "classical prodigy with a musical maturity beyond his years."

Now, at the age of 13, Elisey has over 300,000 subscribers to his YouTube channel, surpassing even Lang Lang in his reach.

While Elisey is still barely a teenager, he recognizes the immense pressure that comes with internet stardom: "When my music videos became more popular, I felt an even bigger responsibility for my performances and the emotions that I projected from the stage to the audience."

So where does his experience at the Cleveland International Piano


Competition for Young Artists rank amongst all of these accolades? "The Cleveland competition is one of the most important things in my life."

Elisey was thrilled to see himself on the list of participants, since "the best young pianists from all over the world were there." And the CIPC for YA was the perfect opportunity for Elisey to showcase his artistry, especially in the concerto round where he shared his "mastery of the instrument, the interaction with the orchestra and, of course, the message itself, that conveys the feelings and emotions in the music that the composer wrote."

But while Elisey's musicality has been heard across the world, he himself had never traveled to the United States before. To get to Cleveland, he had to travel for 48 hours across four flights. "The journey was the longest in my life."

Elisey praised his host family Laura and Erol Beytas for helping him get acclimated - alongside the "beautiful sound and special soulful energy" of the Steinway pianos he practiced and performed on - and is grateful to his family, teachers, and friends for the career he has built so far.

"People are willing to listen and understand the beauty of music and find something special in it. And I'm very happy about that."







The Institute

This summer, Piano Cleveland partnered with the Cleveland Institute of Music and the Lang Lang International Music Foundation (LLIMF), two organizations who are leading the education of young pianists. Together, we presented the first edition of the **Cleveland International Piano Institute for Young Artists**. This innovative, ten-day intensive gave pianists ages 11-18 a first-hand look at conservatory training, combining top-level faculty, CIM's state-of-the-art facilities, and workshops that

gave participants a unique insight into the career of a professional musician. The Institute welcomed nine promising young scholars from LLIMF along with twenty brilliant young artists from around the world for an unforgettable musical and cultural experience.







PianoPals gave local piano students exclusive access to Institute events where they observed world-class artists in masterclasses and recitals. They also connected with fellow piano lovers their age from all over the world through social gatherings and a pen pal program with Institute students.

Many of our **PianoPals** went on to serve on the Junior Jury where they put their newly acquired skills to the test, giving them a taste of what it takes to judge an international piano competition.

"Participating in the Junior Jury and Piano Pals program was a source of inspiration, propelling me to strive for perfection in my own playing.

Collaborating with globally acclaimed professional pianists, while listening attentively to the remarkable skills of young virtuosos, has encouraged me to improve and refine my own pianistic technique and artistic expression."

Cleveland's Young Creatives

Connecting with today's local students in meaningful musical ways is a crucial part of our mission. We presented a variety of programs to seven Cleveland Metropolitan School District (CMSD) schools this year, which included week-long residencies of our Keys to Read program, and revivals of our highly interactive Musical Stories programs.

For the second year in a row, we partnered with Cleveland School of the Arts and the Cleveland Museum of Art to present **Alex and the Monsters**, a musical collaboration for dance, art, and music students.

Three student-only performances were attended by over 1200 students from 12 CMSD schools, and the public performance had 350 people in attendance.







Pianolab

Launched in January 2023, the **PianoLab** program offers after-school group keyboard instruction using a state-of-the-art keyboard lab for children enrolled at Paul L. Dunbar Elementary, a CMSD school on Cleveland's near west side. Since its launch, **over 40 students** have begun weekly introductory piano lessons with CIM Doctoral student, Soo Ji Lee.

Since interest in the program has grown tremendously, plans for additional PianoLabs in CMSD schools are in the works!


